• The State/County Experience

The New Year brings exciting opportunities for faculty participating in the State/County Experience. Feedback from state and county faculty participating in the pilot year of this project has been overwhelming supportive! As a result of participating in the program, state faculty have developed an understanding of how programs are created, developed, and funded at the county level and have developed educational materials that will most effectively support county staff. In turn, county faculty have developed an understanding of the roles and responsibilities of Extension specialists and are working with them to guide the development of educational materials.

We'd like to thank the following state and county faculty for sharing their time and resources to make this program happen.

- 1) Kate Fogarty, youth development specialist in the Department of Family, Youth and Community Sciences is working with Janet Golden (Pinellas County), Germaine Pointer (Broward County), and Nicole Walker (Polk County) to develop evaluation tools and presentation materials for 4H programs.
- 2) Pratap Pullamanappillil, specialist in the Department of Agriculture and Biological Engineering is working with Lamar Christenberry (Escambia County) on a plan for composting and utilization of horse bedding and manure generated at the County's Equestrian Center.
- 3) Danielle Treadwell, specialist in organic and sustainable vegetable production will be making her first site visits with Ed Skvarch (St. Lucie County) and Teresa Olczyk (Miami-Dade County) this February and March.
- 4) Michael Andreu, specialists in forest systems at Mid-Florida REC, Plant City campus will be visiting Eleanor Foerste (Osceola County) and Larry Figart (Duval County) in the next few months.
- 5) Alan Wright, soil and water science specialist at the Everglades REC is working with Pat Miller (Okeechobee County) on a publication about phosphorus removal in turf sod grass.
- 6) Cheryl Mackowiak, specialist in soil and water sciences at the North Florida REC is working with Shep Eubanks (Holmes County) and Gerald Edmondson (Okaloosa County) to develop an organic fertilizer web page.

7) Kelly Morgan, a soil scientist at the Southwest Florida REC is organizing a vegetable irrigation and nutrition workshop for August of this year with Gene McAvoy (Hendry County). Kelly is also working with Steve Brown (Lee County) on a demonstration project with Master Gardeners.

We'd also like to welcome our newest faculty members - Cortney Ohs, specialist in fisheries and aquatic sciences at the Indian River REC and Cody Gray, specialist in aquatic and wetland research at the Ft. Lauderdale REC.

In the future, the State/County Experience program will continue to build strong partnerships and support between state and county faculty. Creating opportunities for collaboration and exchange enables both county and state faculty to more fully comprehend their respective roles within the Institute of Food and Agriculture Sciences.

- Florida Sea Grant Extension (FSGE) coordinated a hurricane action and assessment response in-service training at the Escambia County Extension Hurricane House in Pensacola on January 23-25. Participants included 28 extension faculty from the states of Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Florida and Georgia. Discussion centered around pre-hurricane event, response, recovery and rebuilding strategies and exploration of regional cooperative, mutual aid efforts in preparation for the 2006 hurricane season. The single most popular project was public speaking with over 114,000 youth learning the parts of a speech, researching a topic, preparing a speech, and giving it to a group of youth.

Enrollment in animal and plant projects is stable and historically the generally accepted major part of community club efforts in Florida. A total of 59,623 projects were taken by Florida 4-H members. The most popular included:
