## Success Stories from the South Central District

When Alien Plants Attack, Fight Back- As a result of a request for a training on the identification and management of exotic invasive plants from the Charlotte Harbor Environmental Center (CHEC), Charlotte County Extension Services presented a class entitled "Identification and Management of Exotic Invasive Plants" on Tuesday, September 23<sup>rd</sup>. The management of exotic invasive plants is of great concern to many communities in Florida, as exotic invasive plants not only compete with native plant life, but also cost significant amounts of money to control. Thirty-five (35) participants increased their understanding of exotic invasive plant identification, control strategies, and other considerations. As a result of this program, a survey recorded that 100% of the participants felt more confident about making good decisions concerning implementing invasive exotic plant management strategies, with 58% indicating that they planned to adopt at least one new management option on their own property. A great line-up of Speakers included Dr. Ken Langeland and Dr. Jim Cuda of UF/IFAS; Dr. Jim Burch with the Big Cypress Preserve; Francois Laroche of the South Water Management District; Roger S. Clark with the Six Mile Preserve; and John Rodgers of FDEP, Bureau of Invasive Plants. [Contact : Ralph Mitchell]

Seeing Is Believing - Collier County Extension, in collaboration with the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD), embarked on an 'X-Ttreme Yard Makeover' project. The goal of the X-Treme Yard Makeover project was to demonstrate creating a Florida-friendly yard is more about formulating an integrated, goal-oriented plan with plants that work toward that goal and less about sacrificing aesthetics in favor of water conservation. A 'water wasteland' yard in a high visibility area of Naples was selected. Collier County Extension personnel consulted with the homeowner and designed a landscape that maximized color and guaranteed minimal maintenance, water, fertilizer, pesticide use. Equally minimal was the use of turfgrass. Plant material was 70% native, and the nonnative selections emphasized the importance of cultural compatibility. Invasive exotics were removed, a pervious paver porch constructed, and a state-of-the-art irrigation system installed, utilizing high-efficiency pop-ups for the lawn area, drip and micro-jet for the shrub beds. After establishment, shrubs will need no irrigation during summer months, and only weekly watering during the non-rainy winter months. Over 35 sponsors donated time and materials to illustrate how easy it is to conserve water and still have a beautiful landscape. More than 300 area homeowners joined the sponsors, Senator Burt Saunders and SFWMD Board Member Charles Dauray for the public presentation of the project on June 28th. The project will be monitored by Collier County Extension and SWFMD personnel through June 2009. The project expects to exceed a water savings of over 75,000 gallons per year. [Contact: Cathy Feser]

**Screening for Developmental Delays of Children** – The healthy development of a child is something that most of us take for granted. We expect the physical, social, cognitive, behavioral and emotional growth of a child to progress at a constant, predictable and probable rate. Unfortunately, not every child fits that mold. Many children have developmental delays that will make learning difficult or slowed unless intervention programs are recommended and started early – long before formal

schooling begins. Extension participates in monthly Child Developmental Screenings managed and conducted by the Early Childhood Council, Florida Diagnostic and Learning Resources Systems, USF, and county schools. Free screenings are offered to the community for delays or problems with behaviors, speech, language, motor skills, vision, hearing and cognition for children birth to five years of age in targeted rural or hard to reach populations. Extension provides a valuable service for parents with one-on-one consultations on their child's behavior and development. Parents are also taught how to work with their children to strengthen skills and encourage each child to reach his or her potential. The earlier parents receive this information, the earlier they can work with their child or be referred for help, if needed. Many delays can be removed or reduced if tackled early. There were 1,908 children screened in the 2007-08 program year, with 90% of these children referred on for further evaluation, assessment or beneficial programs and services. The screening partnership was deemed a "best practice" by the Florida Department of Education in 1996. (Contact: Diana Converse)

Good Taste Comes to Lee - The assortments of fruits that grow in Florida, and how to grow, cook and eat them remain a mystery for most of its residents. Locally grown tropical fruits are often strange in their appearance and taste. 'A Taste of Lee' exhibition was conceived to introduce the sight, smell, feel, and taste of these exotic fruits to local gardeners, landscapers, chefs, and consumers. It was also designed to introduce small farmers to market niches. Thus, other locally grown products and added value items were also exhibited at 'A Taste of Lee.' It was also intended that those who attended the 'Tasting' would be encouraged to grow the produce that delighted them. The agricultural, horticulture, and family and consumer science agents were involved in the planning and execution of the 'Tasting'. The event garnered the support of the local Caloosa Rare Fruit Society. The society members were important in planning and displaying tropical fruits at the exhibition. Success of the Tasting was measured by the overwhelming response of consumers. Within five hours, well over 1,500 people literally tasted 'A Taste of Lee' and surrounding counties. Vendors, including beekeepers and plant growers, got a shot in the financial arm. During this first year, A Taste of Lee outgrew its venue. The 2009 event will be held at a larger facility and will involve local chefs cooking locally grown produce. You are invited. **4-H Leaders Make 4-H Happen!** Two of our most important teaching events occurred in the 4-H program in August. First was the annual 4-H Leaders Round Up, an annual meeting and workshop session for current 4-H volunteers. More than 60 adult volunteers (and one teen volunteer) participated in this year's meeting, and 40 returned program evaluations, indicating high levels of satisfaction with the materials and information presented. The second workshop was a six-hour 4-H New Leader Training Course. Three hours are delivered through materials sent ahead of time by mail and three hours on site with the 4-H agents. Eight new volunteers participated in that session, with the expectation of three new 4-H clubs and two existing clubs with new leadership. The great success is that although 4-H is still widely known as the "program for farm kids," it continues to expand and grow in Polk County and continues to be recognized as the leading youth development organization in the world.
