


Staying Connected

It's Never Too Late... to write an ancestral history

- Start with a burning desire to learn more about your family.
- Research different types of ancestral books from libraries, friends, family, etc.
 Creating a book unique to your family is only limited by your creativity. There is a

myriad of themes, almost anything you can dream of is possible.

- Every family has a story that is unique. Highlight your uniqueness by creating interesting stories utilizing clues from the past which will enhance the narrative. Collect and incorporate items from the family or other sources including photographs, letters, diaries, public records, notes, wills, scrap books, and family trees.
- Create interest by utilizing opportunities to incorporate mystery, intrigue, celebration and recognitions in the narrative.
- Consider the family and include topics that were relevant in the past, pertinent today and will also be of value to future generations.
- Create an outline, time line and scope for your book and try to stick to the plan.
- The overall goal is to create a book that is truly informative, educational and also interesting to read. 


Hall of Fame Inductees
