UF/IFAS Hurricane and Disaster Communications Plan

This presentation covers the University of Florida IFAS's Hurricane and Disaster Communications Plan, aimed at ensuring effective communication before, during, and after storms. It is designed for UF/IFAS Extension agents to enhance preparedness and response capabilities. Key points include outlining specific duties of communications team members for seamless information flow, providing essential resources like infographics and guidelines for efficient coordination, and highlighting how to access necessary resources and support through Microsoft Teams. The presentation details which audiences to inform at each stage and the importance of clear communication channels, identifies miscommunication mistakes to avoid in community and online communications during disasters, and provides a timeline of actions and communications before, during, and after a storm. Finally, it differentiates between response and recovery phases, emphasizing the role of Extension in long-term recovery.
